A group from Denver SE Club visited the project in July 2007. 3/08 The water structures survived the riots which occurred in the Kibera slum. The people feel that they own the water system. Therefore, they take a proactive stance to manage and protect it for the community.</p> <p>From the minutes of the District WTF meeting of 5/21/08, "Steve Werner reported that the Kibera project in Kenya is going well. They have had a visit from USAID's top urban specialist, and there is the possibility now of more funding for water kiosks in Kibera from USAID. The project has demonstrated that Rotary can address urban water needs. They have also had a visit from Minneapolis area Rotarians, who will raise a further \$100K.."</p> <p>On 9/15/2008, Mike Klingbiel reported:</p> <p>Good to hear from you. The wetcores are Water kiosks, bathrooms and showers. Our Grant will build 10, and was for \$330,000. I am now working on getting other organizations involved to help complete all of Kibera. The most promising is USAID (our Federal Government funding for other countries) They have seen our project in Kibera, and are interested in discussing how we might partner. Nothing formal yet. I am seeking 3 million dollars from them to complete Kibera. This would be outside and separate from our grant. Our completion of the project should be the fall of 2009, for Rotary's piece. We are still on track, as no damage happened to our structures during the riots.</p> <p>This project has been written up favorably in the <i>Rotarian</i>. We received a very informative report by David Kuria at our February 10, 2009 meeting.</p>

Denver Rotary Boulder	\$1,000	Joe Jensen 06-07	Remediation protocol's aimed at academic learning deterrents, specifically hearing loss, ADHD, and Auditory processing disorder. The training requires books, DVDs and other training materials.	2/07 Pediatricians in Mante attended seven hours of training by Boulder participants in the diagnosis and management of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, ADHD. Twelve teachers, psychologists, social workers and speech pathologists from three schools reviewed cases with the Boulder participants. 6/07 Mante pediatricians met with staff at the three schools to evaluate 16 children with ADHD. This is a major improvement because previously those children were sent to neurologists in cities two hours away. Now they can be seen locally and followed more closely to coordinate care between physicians and schools. Two schools and three physicians offices were set up with webcams so that Mante participants could talk with Boulder participants by video conferencing. Instant messaging is also used to gain consultation about a child from a pediatrician and child psychiatrist in Boulder. 12/07 Project has been recognized by the International Child Health Section of the American Academy of Pediatrics. On 0908/08, Bill Eckert, Chair of WCS for the Boulder Flatirons Club, reported: The project continues to move ahead- Dr. Peter Dawson went there in July and he made contacts with the professionals involved- We will send money as requested to a bank account for distribution- At this point the work continues, but at a slow pace- Hopefully we will expend our funds during the 2008-09 period. All interim reports have been submitted to RI.

Seattle (Lead Club)	\$12,000	Irv Buck	07-08	<p>This is a reforestation project to improve the watershed in this area north of Bombay. A series of dams, bundts, canals, and terraces will be built, and thousands of saplings will be planted. The result will retain monsoon rainfall, prevent further erosion, improve the water source by raising the water table, provide a continuous source of potable water for domestic use, kick start a local agri-economy, and provide a continuous, sustainable eco-system.</p> <p>The lead club, Seattle is still in the process of soliciting more clubs to participate. Our check request was sent on 4/04/08. 5/12/08 Work on the project commenced. Janet Greiner of the Lodo Club gave a report at our 3/10/09 meeting. The greatest need continues to be sustainable water. 300 gully plugs and 1,500 trenches have already been built. Another major goal is preventing the villagers from moving to the slums of Mumbai. One sign of progress is in the Talavalli village. Here women, who once had to spend most of the day carrying water, now have started a brick industry to build better homes. Future projects include education, medical treatment and reforestation.</p> <p>Arrow Sinha Roy of the Mumbai Midtown Club sent us a report in April, which shows the rewards and frustrations which come with such a large project. A city of Mumbai road project had been siphoning off many workers who could be used for the watershed project. However, a meeting in February convinced many locals to stay with the project after being reminded of its importance to the area, and also being offered more money. Another problem was with dam construction. It turned out that the bed rock was deeper than expected, necessitating much higher costs. Then a miracle happened! In Arrow's own words, "...God has come to our aid! Suddenly the government Irrigation Dept. has come forward to begin construction of a dam exactly where we wanted our 3rd dam to be sited! It's truly a miracle as the Dept. received funding because of the forthcoming national elections! The ruling party wants to retain rural votes after doing precious little in the tribal area for the past 5 years." Arrow also reported that planting saplings for reforestation begins in May, and that his club "passed the hat" and got \$1,200 U.S. for a pre-school in the Baste village.</p>

This project will provide supplies for two private schools in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo for basic and vocational education to an underserved part of the population – 1) Basic student school supplies for 2,000 total students. 2) Textbooks in literacy, math and history for all grade levels. 3) commercial quality sewing machines, sewing class tools and accessories. 4) Woodworking and carpentry tools and equipment for Woodshop classrooms including hand tools, power tools and power generators. Each vocational class will produce products such as tables, chairs, student uniforms, clothing. The sale of these items will partially reimburse the school for costs of teacher salaries, and materials for these classes.

Russia's health system has deteriorated in the last 10 years and very little health care is now available, especially outside of the major cities. The purpose of this project is to establish health fairs in all Rotary communities in Russian, building on the success of the 90 health fairs already completed in Russia.

Project approved May 2006. Our check sent to TRF on 6-16-06, and District 5450 has sent its check. The Grant was announced at the Rotary in Russia Conference June 2006, where the new Rotary District in Western Russia was inaugurated and sessions on the health fair program were led by the Russian Health Fair founders, Rotarians Evgenia Klokova and Dr. Irina Rubashek from Vladivostok. Money has been received by Homer Alaska club. Grant shared with us an email he received 8/11/08 which details the explosive growth of Russian health fairs. There are now almost 1,000 fairs, mostly conducted by volunteers. More than 5,000 medical personnel and 500 plus Russian Rotarians have served over 65,000 Russian citizens. The message concludes by thanking our club and 9 Health Fair for financial and training support. It also thanks us for hosting 30 Russians with the Open World teams in 04/08.
